Dr Andrew Shepherd has twenty years experience facilitating learning in the areas of theology, ethics and environmental studies. He has teaching and research roles with a range of NZ and US tertiary education institutions, including being a current Research Affiliate with the Centre for Theology and Public Issues, University of Otago. His present day-to-day role is as the Co-Director of the Christian conservation organisation A Rocha Aotearoa New Zealand. His recent publications include: *The Gift of the Other: Levinas, Derrida, and a Theology of Hospitality* (2014); *Taking Rational Trouble over the Mystery: Reactions to Atheism* (edited with Nicola Hoggard Creegan, 2013); and *Creation and Hope: Anticipation and Promise in Aotearoa* (edited with Nicola Hoggard Creegan, forthcoming). He lives with his family in the Makarora valley, on the doorstep of Mt Aspiring National Park. As well as outdoor adventuring, as a family they enjoy sharing their home and the beauty of the surrounding area with an array of friends, guests and strangers who pass through their lives.

'THOUGHT MATTERS' CONFERENCE

Thought Matters is the annual conference organised and facilitated by The Salvation Army Tri-Territorial Theological Forum (TTTF). The TTTF exists to facilitate theological discussion which informs ministry practice. It is composed of representatives from each of the contributing territories—Australia Eastern, Australia Southern and New Zealand, Fiji and Tonga.

Thought Matters is a forum for exploration and discussion. While this conference is supported by territorial leaders in each of the three contributing territories, it is not a forum for debating or deciding official policy or positions. This conference is put on by The Salvation

Army for Salvation Army purposes. Registration is open to anyone who is willing to engage in constructive dialogue on this basis.

EXPECTATIONS OF DELEGATES

The **Thought Matters** conference is a safe and respectful space for theological conversation. The aim of the conference is to explore ideas rather than convince others of the rightness or otherwise of any particular position.

In line with the purpose and culture of the conference it is expected that all delegates will be respectful in their conversations with others, honest and fair in their representations of conference content to others, and respectful of the right of others to hold different views of scripture, theology and ministry. Therefore delegates are expected to demonstrate grace and compassion in all conversations during and associated with the **Thought Matters** conference.

If the conference organisers consider that your conduct is not meeting these expectations, we will discuss this with you. If an appropriate resolution is not reached we reserve the right to cancel your registration. You would then be required to leave the conference.
