- unplanned, unprepared waffling on presentations – ppt is really good for keeping it on track, rues, i really enjoyed rakai and Missy presentation, kaumatua, nCS tend to dictate how we should do things

- all orgs are relevant, it is important to have insight of what orgs work and vision are and who are effective
- the ones that spoke went on too much
- stting and listening too long

What have you learnt about your organisation/sector contribution to “whanau ora” and which of the four pathways do they align to most in the Korowai Oranga?

- Not sure as He korowai is a MOH document
- development of whanau, hapu , iwi and Maori communities; Maori participation in the gambling sector requires active participation from all sectors as well
- exchanging contact details and keep in touch with each other
- confirmation we work all four pathways and are passionate about the work (+1,2
- whanau ora requires time and relationship building, not all whanau ora concepts fits into contracts, our organisations is addressing and moving towards whanau ora are slowly but surely

- mainstream organisations continue to struggle with the principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi
- you cant have one without the other
- all of them, Te Kotahitanga, matauranga, manaakitanga, whakawhanungatanga, nga kai mahi
- virtue of compassion and love, acceptance/non judgemental
- important to develop tamariki and rangatahi , and to grow leaders, continue to strengthen and develop our whanau, hapu and iwi (+1
- working across all sectors and maintaining whanau ora
- networking, keeping in contact, communicate with each other
- need to address the korowai of kaumatua as the essential component in our services
- the reminder of WO principles useful after 5 years outside NZ but also how they may apply in PG sector at such an early stage in my role.

- Developing relationships that enhance participation and involvement of and for rangatahi/whanaungatanga with rangatahi in Wellington and Invercargill
 - more with rangatahi
 - encourage youth participation
 - continue to communicate with other service providers especially with MOH
 - holistic in the tikanga
 - PGF – Oasis helpline general services to adopt and not think that thats our job to do it,

- Manaaki, tautoko, korero, kai, kaumatua, whakaoriori and waiata big ticks
 - Take it Taranaki – we should pass the rakau as part of the closing ceremony
 - continue to be creative, hui well organised.
 - Te Rangihaeata did a great job and Terry
 - loved the manaaki from Te Rangihaeata (+1,2
 - karakia to ensure Napier/Taupo road is open
 - encourage the speakers to use the microphone
 - earlier preparation
 - message of enlightenment through song and dance (remains concreted in Hinengaro)
 - standards and quality needs to be maintained
 - have a micro phone for speakers to use
 - add more time for presentations
 - white board where kaimahi questions can be answered during the hui and what they would like to take away from the hui, and time slot at end to address these and other issues, invite people from Minister of Maori Affairs, Education , Police, Housing, Justice, local Govt, Consumers
 - get more funding earlier for hui
- Marae based hui, initiating a rangatahi forum
- Dish out some jobs for us to help prep etc..
 - needs to be solutions based focus, focussed collaborative approaches, disseminate learnings from these hui for instance

- have a youth stream where we can discuss the same things but in our way the way we learn best to get the most out of the hui.
