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

#### THE SALVATION ARMY GUERNSEY

New Zealand Salvationists in the 'Guernsey'

The Red Guernsey was a notable clothing feature during the early years of The Salvation Army. It was an unusual fashion choice by The Salvation Army when Victorian England fancied black.



the plainness of the dark uniform. But while many guernseys featured the words 'Salvation Army', it was not uncommon for salvationists to produce home made guernseys with the 'Blood & Fire' crest. Theologically red was a logical choice. The photographic record of the late 19th century evidences the variety of guernseys that existed. Even Ernest Holdaway wore a quernsey. But because his work as an officer was amongst the Māori his guernsey featured the words 'Te taua whakaora', used in 1888 before The Salvation Army adopted 'Te ope whakaora' in 1889.





### ALL IN THE PLANNING

Auckland Congress Hall, Grey's Avenue, Auckland




Construction of the Auckland Congress Hall in Grey's Avenue, Auckland was completed in 1928. The stone laying ceremony had occurred on Monday 27 February 1928, and several months later the opening, on Saturday 25 August 1928.

"On the Saturday evening, Salvationists and others again filled to over-flowing the Congress Hall primarily to give thanks to God for His goodness. In this gathering, Staff-Captain Dale [Australian Officer] received a rousing welcome as he rose to give a description of the various appointments of the building. In the performance of his duties as architect, the Staff-Captain has paid four visits to New Zealand." (The War Cry 1 September 1928 pg9).

Among the many buildings to which Staff-Captain Percival Dale contributed were: The Sydney Training College; a cottage development at Box Hill in Melbourne; People's Palace, Sydney; Perth Fortress Corps and Perth People's Palace; Auckland Congress Hall, New Zealand; People's Palace, Melbourne; Young Women's Hostel, Adelaide. ### THE QUEREE QUERY

Sister-in-Law Ivy Knight and the gold Salvation Army badge

Ivy Knight appears in the Queree-Knight wedding party photo, which was recently located as part of an enquiry relating to the bride, Margaret Louisa Dorothy Queree. She married Benjamin Knight, on November 26th 1919, on his return from active war service in France. Ivy Knight was a bridesmaid and sister of the groom and the wedding took place at the Wellington South Salvation Army hall. The War Cry reports the bride as carrying a bouquet of white roses while the bridesmaids carried pink roses.

Even the drum Ben Knight played in the band was decorated with lilies and white flowers. The Queree and Knight families were associated with the corps at Wellington South from its early decades and when Margaret Knight died in 1991 she was listed as the No.1 soldier on the Wellington South soldiers' roll. ## MY FRIEND BRIGADIER IVY KNIGHT

A tribute from 1995 by Sister Mrs M Cranstoun

"My friend, Brigadier Ivy Knight (R), was to be called Ivy Florence but her father registered her as Harriet Elizabeth, which name lvy only used on official forms. She worked in a shoe factory as a young person - her brother Will was a well-known Salvation Army Officer.

"Ivy was stationed with Mildred Bycroft at Carterton and they remained together for the rest of Mildred's life [1948]. Then Ivy spent the rest of her working life in People's Palaces. While at Auckland People's Palace, she was entertained to afternoon tea by Queen Salote of Tonga.

"Ivy and Mildred served The Salvation Army together at Nightcaps in 1941. Wartime and petrol was a very precious commodity so they used their pushbikes to visit Ohau nine kilometres and Otautau 22 kilometres to deliver War Crys and do visitation.

"Gravel roads in those days and Ivy came off her bike on a hill and was picked up by miners going to work for the afternoon shift at Ohau who brought her back to Nightcaps. Ivy and Mildred also held juniors at Tinkertown and Wario.

"When Ivy retired from Officership she went to live in Napier with Miss Dorothy Burgess, a child evangelism worker.

"Ivy was a Christmas Day baby and she loved and served the Christ of Christmas all her Life!." (The War Cry 4 November 1995)
